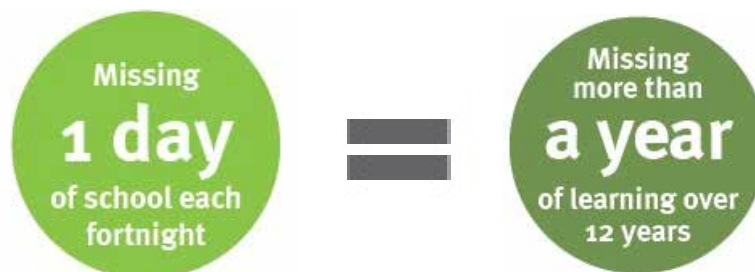
Attendance

The most fundamental key to success of each student is regular attendance at school. This includes being at school on time each day and being ready to learn. Cooroy State School students are expected to maintain attendance rate above 95% at all times. For Term 1 we had an attendance of 91.8%. An attendance rate of 90% equates to 20 days off school per year, which does not allow for a student to reach excellence. Every day, on time attendance, is THE most important component of a student's success and is expected of every student.

School Sport

The P&C and school are investigating the possibility of building a new Outside of School Hours Care facility which will support the increasing number of families wanting to use this resource. Together with our Business Manager, Mrs Mackenzie, I met with Mr Linnane from Facilities on 27 April to discuss this proposal and gain support for this initiative. The suggested site is on the West Boundary, running North/South across the Northern end car park. This has been added as first priority to the School Infrastructure Plan.

Road Safety

National Road Safety Week is now in its 9th year. With approximately 1200 people killed and another 44,000 seriously injured every year on Australian roads, the Week brings focus to how, by working together, we can save lives and prevent serious injuries. National Road Safety Week is from 16-23 May and the key message is 'Lead the way: drive so others survive'. This is a great opportunity to put the spotlight on road safety and it would be terrific if you can support the initiative. We can all do our bit to ensure that road safety is a priority. Every time you are on the road, choose to drive so others survive. You can show support by:

- Discussing driving safely with your family and friends
- Wearing a yellow ribbon or attaching a yellow ribbon to your car, bicycle or motorcycle

School Parking & Drop off and Pick up Area and Buses

We have had many parents comment on the situation at the pick-up and drop-off area. Please note that we agree with everyone's concerns. Solutions to these issues are complex and rely on a mix of the school's actions, council improvements and upgrades, policing, state and federal government support and importantly parent and carer patience and understanding. You may have noticed an increase in policing in this area. The Police have advised that they would first be giving warnings. However, they have advised that they will be issuing infringements if the situation does continue as will Council Officers. The school will be meeting with Council Officers and Police on the 26th May to discuss ways to alleviate this present traffic situation.

There are parking rules that apply around schools, especially around school entrances. When using a drop-off and pick-up area you:

- Must use the area like a quick moving taxi rank.
- Need to move forward in the queue of vehicles to the signed area.
- Can get out of the vehicle to quickly help your children to get in and out safely (once in the signed area) – however must not walk away from the vehicle.
- Are only allowed 2 minutes in the signed area (if you take any longer you can be fined). If your children are not ready to get straight into your vehicle at pick-up time, you will need to drive around the block and queue to enter the area again.
- Should only let your children out once you have pulled into the signed area (it is dangerous to let them out while waiting in a queue).
- Should teach your children to look out for your vehicle and get in quickly when you pull up
- Must enter front in (never Reverse).

School staff are at the pickup zone until 3:15 then at this time remaining students are taken to the office and parents called. There are very few cars after 3:05 and it is suggested parents to come a little later and the traffic situation may be alleviated.

2021 Camps

Leadership Day: Countryside Realty & Lori Biffin have kindly donated \$1000 toward the school Leadership Program. We have organised for the 21 Year 6 Leaders and Mrs McClean to travel to the High School Outdoor Education Centre, Mimburi, at Belli Park on the 20th May for a Leadership Program which will include group initiative and survival skills activities to support their leadership aspirations. We are envisioning this to be an annual event.

Year 6 Camp: Longreach - Sunday 12th September and returning on Friday 17th September. I am sure our children will enjoy meeting our Western Queensland neighbours and in return our Outback friends will appreciate our visit and supporting their economy. We now have 72 confirmed students attending which is fantastic. With the fall in numbers, this number of students has pushed the costs up over budget, but we have kept the costs to \$800 for each student.

The Year 5 Camp: Currimundi Recreation Camp - Wednesday 15th to Friday 17th September. We have managed to keep costs at \$200 per student and 61 students are attending this camp.



COVID 19

Thank you so much for your continued patience and understanding as we adapt to the COVID-19 changes and challenges for 2021.

As mentioned in correspondence last Term, the following is the information regarding COVID-19 restrictions for Queensland Schools.

- There is no need to obtain parents' and carers' contact details, as these are already recorded in OneSchool and can be used for contact tracing by Queensland Health if needed.

However, all other visitors need to adhere to COVID19 school visitor and sign-in arrangements.

- Parents and carers can access the school facilities as long as they follow the COVID safe practices. I am also pleased to advise that parents are now allowed into classrooms but this will be limited to a maximum 2 at a time and must follow COVID19 safe principles.

- Parent Volunteers must sign in before going to class and sign out at the office on departure.

- Normal school attendance arrangements apply. If a student is unwell, they must not attend school. As advised by Queensland Health and the Chief Health Officer, anyone who develops a fever, cough, sore throat or shortness of breath should contact their doctor or call 13HEALTH (13 43 25 84) and get tested.

While the new normal allows us to go about our daily lives without too much adjustment, we all know the situation can change rapidly. Make sure you stay informed as the restrictions may change based on Queensland Health advice and the Department of Education guidelines.

Deputy Principal's Report

PBL – Positive Behaviour for Learning

It has been impressive to see the amount of 'Catch-a-C' tickets students have been receiving and dropping into the office. To recap the process, and for those new to school, the 'Catch a Cs' are part of our whole school positive reinforcement program to reward great behaviour choices and actions.

- Each Staff Member receives 10 white 'Catch a C' tickets per week.
- 'Catch a C's' are handed out by staff in the classroom or playground to students who are doing exceptional things in regards to meeting the school expectations of; caring for yourself, learning, others, and the school.
- The 'Catch a C' ticket is shown by the Student to their teacher for further positive reinforcement and an extra stamp on their individual Possum Chart in the classroom.
- Students then place their 'Catch a C' in the 'Catch a C' boxes at the office and each week 10 tickets (5 upper school, 5 lower school) are drawn on parade with the lucky recipient entering the stage and earning a yellow 'Catch a C' which can later be cashed in at the tuckshop for an ice-block!



All students should feel great pride when they receive a white or yellow 'Catch a C' for a great deed at school. It is always an enjoyable conversation at the office to ask students; what they received their 'Catch a C' for and which staff member had given them this. Also as they can be given by any staff member, to any student (regardless of whether they are currently teaching them or not) it is also a positive way to build rapport between students and staff who may work in other areas of the school. In support of the program, ask your child at home; have they received a 'Catch a C' lately? And what great thing did they do to receive one?

The 2nd part of the reinforcement program for PBL at Cooroy SS is of course the Possum Charts in every class with the successful completion of charts culminating in students receiving their Post Card, Brilliant, Awesome and Epic Certificates and attendance at EPIC Day in Week 10.

Students should have received their Brilliant certificate at this part of the Semester, and are starting to receive Awesome Certificates to remain on track for the Epic Certificate.

The 2021 Australian Early Development Census

Counting on parents

The Australian Early Development Census (AEDC) is a national census that builds a picture of the health and wellbeing of children as they start their first year of full-time school.

Every school with children in their first year of full-time school has a vital role to play in helping our nation collect the information it needs to support our children and their families as we recover from the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Since 2009, communities, schools and governments across Australia have used results from the AEDC to help provide the right kinds of services, resources and support.

From May 2021, teachers will complete the Instrument (AvEDI) about children in their first year of full-time school.

AEDC results for individual children are not reported and individual children cannot be identified.

With the support of parents/carers and schools we can build a more complete picture of childhood development in Australia. If parents/carers consent to the collection of their child's information they do not need to do anything. Parent/carers only need to contact the school if they do not consent to the collection of their child's information.

Eumundi-Kenilworth Road Batter Protection

Construction advice: April 2021

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) would like to advise that construction works to support and strengthen a 50m section of roadside batter on the eastbound side of Eumundi-Kenilworth Road (west of Gheerulla Road) will commence soon.

When complete, the works will provide a safer road for motorists and include:

- minor vegetation clearing
- selective tree removal to accommodate the works
- excavating the eastbound lane pavement and existing slope batter
- reconstructing the slope batter and eastbound lane pavement
- amending signage and linemarking, as required.

Please note the excavation and reconstruction of the eastbound lane pavement will reduce Eumundi-Kenilworth Road to single lane only in the construction zone, which will temporarily restrict traffic flow. Temporary traffic signals will be in place to control traffic during construction.

TMR understands roadworks can be frustrating for nearby residents and road users and acknowledges the cooperation and patience of stakeholders during construction.

What to expect

Works will commence late April and will take six to eight weeks to complete, weather permitting. While every effort will be made to keep disruptions and noise to a minimum, please note the following:

- Work hours will be between 6am and 6pm, Monday to Friday.
- Traffic management will be in place for the duration of the works. Motorists can expect lane closures, reduced speed limits and traffic control. Variable message signage will also be in place on both approaches to the construction area.
- Road users can expect delays of up to ten minutes. There may be times when road users experience longer delays and, as much as possible, these will be managed outside of peak travel times.
- Noise and possible dust from construction activities and machinery can be expected.
- Reversing beepers and flashing lights are a safety requirement and will be used during working hours.
- Priority access through the work zone will be given to emergency vehicles.
